- 1. Throughout the interview schedule [the resident]/[the resident's] and s/he/his/her is used to refer to the resident this interview is about. Please substitute for a more appropriate term. This could be the resident's name, the relationship to the interviewee or a generic term, such as his/her/they, depending upon the context.
- 2. For each domain we are asking the interviewee to say how they think the resident feels about this aspect of his or her life andwhether the respondent agrees with how the resident feels. If the respondent does not agree how the resident feels, they will be asked to answer the question from their personal view of the resident's situation.
- 3. Each set of questions has a notes section where you can record differences between the interviewee's personal opinion and what they think the resident feels. You can also record any contextual information, or reasoning for a person's answer in the notes section.
- 4. This interview schedule is intended for use as part of a mixed-methods toolkit, and not recommended to be used as a standalone interview.
- 5. There are two questions in each domain. The first asks what the person's situation is like now, living in the care home (current SCRQoL) and the second asks them to imagine what the person's situation would be without the care and support provided by the care home (expected SCRQoL).
- 6. When asking the interviewee to think about the resident's quality of life without the support and environment of the care home, please remind them that they should answer the question by assuming all other help (e.g. from family members) does not change from is happening now (e.g. we assume that they do not step in to compensate for loss of services). For example, if a resident currently has one visit a week from a family member and the rest of their social contact is with staff and other residents, when thinking of their life without the care home, we assume the resident would still have that weekly social contact with family but no other social contact would replace the staff and other residents of the care home.
- 7. When interviewing family members and friends of the care home resident, please reassure them that these questions are only imaginary and designed to help us measure the impact of the care home upon the life of the resident. Taking part will not affect the services the resident receives in any way. Where necessary, also reassure staff.
- 8. Question 16 is should not be included in staff interviews. Please only ask it if you are interview a friend or relative of [the resident].



Introduction

To help us to measure the impact of this care home on the lives of residents, we have been observing the daily lives of residents. Where possible, we are also asking residents how they feel about their quality of life. Because this is not always possible, it is useful to get other perspectives, such as staff/members of the resident's family.

I'll ask you some questions about different aspects of [the resident's] life at the moment. Then I'll ask you to imagine a situation where they do not have the support and services provided by [the care home] that they do now. This is a purely imaginary situation and the answer you give will not affect the services that [the resident] receives. The purpose of these questions is to measure how the services and support affect [the resident's] life.

When answering the questions, you will be asked about different aspects of the person's life at the moment. For each question, firstly you will be asked to say how you think the person feels about that aspect of their lfie. You will then be asked if you feel differently to how you think [the resident] feels. You can then answer the question from your point of view.

Interviewer note: there is space at the end of each section for you to write notes. You may wish to record any additional or contextual information given by the interviewee.

If the interviewee feels differently about the questions compared to how they think [the resident] does, please record here too.
